### Baroque Artists of Champaign-Urbana

BACH is Champaign-Urbana's premier chamber choir. Joseph Baldwin is its second music director, succeeding Chester L. Alwes in 2017.

The Baroque Artists of Champaign-Urbana, Illinois ("BACH") was founded as a project-based professional ensemble in 1996 for teaching, learning, and performing music of the Baroque era. Now a thriving nonprofit organization, BACH is proud of the diverse range of its repertoire—from its roots in Baroque music to today's most exciting new works by living composers. Today's audiences enjoy programs featuring both favorite Baroque masterpieces and leading works from across the entire choral repertory.

It is a true community enterprise, welcoming experienced singers from the community, university, and surrounding areas, as well as the support of committed volunteers. BACH was named "Chamber Ensemble of the Year 2000" by the Illinois Council of Orchestras. It receives support from the Illinois Arts Council, as well as many generous local donors individual and corporate.

# MEET THE ARTISTS

Katherine Buzard, soprano, has performed a wide range of solo and choral repertoire in the US and abroad. Notably, she was the soprano soloist in Mahler's Fourth Symphony with the Princeton University Orchestra on its tour to Ireland and was the soprano soloist in a performance of Bach's *Magnificat* at the famed Thomaskirche in Leipzig. She also had the privilege of giving a pre-concert solo recital before Joyce DiDonato's own recital in Princeton, NJ, in 2014, and in 2015 she sang a selection of Handel arias with baroque instrumentalists at Kensington Palace. Her operatic roles include Venus (Blow: Venus & Adonis), Poppea (Monteverdi: L'incoronazione di Poppea), Nancy (Britten: Albert Herring), Ernesto (Scarlatti: La Principessa Fedele), and Lucy (Menotti: The Telephone). She received an MMus in vocal performance from the Royal College of Music in London and a BA in music with a certificate in vocal performance from Princeton University. She currently studies with Cynthia Haymon-Coleman and performs frequently around the Champaign-Urbana area.

**Robert Grisbrook**, baritone, is currently studying for a master's in vocal performance and literature at the University of Illinois following a threeyear spell as a journalist based in London, England. Most recently, he took part in the premier of a new opera, *The Surrogate*, in association with Lyric Theatre @ Illinois and the Illinois Modern Ensemble. He also performed the roles of Ping in Puccini's *Turandot* and El Dancairo in Bizet's *Carmen* as part of a collection of opera scenes staged by Lyric Theatre. He previously performed with BACH as the bass soloist in both its Messiah Sing-Along and Easter concert of music by Heinrich Schütz.

**Kathy Kew Lee** is an avid singer who has performed as a soloist, member, and section leader of many choirs including the UIUC Chamber Singers, VOCE in Hartford, CT, the Yale Camerata and Chamber Choir, Vocal Arts Ensemble of Durham, Boston's Cantata Singers, and numerous church choirs. Since graduating from Brown University with a bachelor of arts in music and psychology, Kathy has taught voice lessons and performed in various venues as a soloist. During her time at Brown, she received the Brown University Music Faculty Premium award and first place at the Rhode Island National Association of Teachers of Singing for three consecutive years. While in Boston, Kathy worked with the PALS Children's Chorus as conductor of their youngest choir, as well as vocal coach for musical theater and special projects. Aside from singing with BACH, Kathy's favorite

musical collaborations are those she shares with her twin sister, husband, and two sons.

**Amy Thoren**, alto, is pastor and director at St. Andrew's Lutheran Campus Center. She holds a B.A. from St. Olaf College and an MDiv from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. She studied and lived in Germany before being ordained in 2004, and she served two congregations in the *other* twin cities (Minneapolis/St Paul) before landing in Central llinois. She loves biking, music, arts, language, composting with worms, and all things sustainably green.

Andrew Turner, tenor, has performed a variety of lead and supporting roles in Washington State and Illinois including "Frederick Frankenstein" in *Young Frankenstein* and "Don Ottavio" in the recent production of *Don Giovanni* at the Lyric Theatre of Illinois. He had his UIUC Oratorio Society debut in their recent spring performance of Rachmaninoff's "All Night Vigil" and was featured as a soloist in the University of Illinois' Bach Cantata series. Currently he is pursuing a master's degree in performance and literature at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign where he's studying with professor Jerold Siena.

### MEET THE MUSIC DIRECTOR



A person of diverse artistic interests, **Joseph Baldwin** is a conductor whose primary work explores the integration of choral music, dynamic programming and presentation, the conductor as servant leader, and the transformative power of community engagement.

In 2017, Joseph was appointed as Music Director of the Baroque Artists of Champaign Urbana (BACH), succeeding Chester L. Alwes. From 2012-2015, Joseph served on the faculty at Smith College (MA), where he

was the Iva Dee Hiatt Distinguished Assistant Director of Choral Activities and taught full-time in the Department of Music. He has held key appointments with the University of Massachusetts Amherst as a Visiting Professor of Music, Berkshire Choral International as a Staff Conductor, the Grammy<sup>®</sup> Award-winning choral ensembles at the University of Michigan, and the choirs of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. An active guest conductor and collaborator, he has enjoyed conducting engagements with SongFest at The Colburn School and the Five College New Music Festival (MA) as well as conducting fellowships with the Oregon Bach Festival (as a member of the renowned Master Class in Conducting) and the Yale School of Music—Norfolk Chamber Music Festival. Joseph is passionate about contemporary music and regularly partners with thriving composers, including Dominick DiOrio and Anne LeBaron. He has assisted in the preparation of choruses for performances with conductors such as Leonard Slatkin, Kent Tritle, and Nicholas Cleobury. A strong advocate for the choral arts at all levels, Joseph is an active guest clinician and adjudicator with ensembles in the professional/young artist, collegiate, secondary, and spiritual settings. From 2010 to 2012, he served as Founding Artistic Director of the Community Chorus of Detroit, now a cultural force in the Detroit-area arts scene. A baritone, Joseph has sung as a professional member of some of the nation's leading ensembles, including the Yale Choral Artists, Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival Singers, and the University Musical Society Choral Union/Detroit Symphony Orchestra. He was a National Board Member (MA) for the National Collegiate Choral Organization from 2012-2015.

Joseph currently serves as the Assistant Director of Development for the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He has completed all coursework toward a Doctor of Musical Arts in Choral Music, also at the University of Illinois. He received the Master of Music in Conducting from the University of Michigan, where he studied with Jerry Blackstone. At Northwestern University, Joseph graduated with the Bachelor of Music (cum laude), with additional studies toward a Bachelor of Arts in the five-year double-degree program. He is also a dedicated student of yoga, currently practicing at Lois Steinberg's B.K.S. Iyengar Yoga Institute of Champaign-Urbana.

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

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
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
